

Bidston Moss

Where: Bidston, North Wirral

Size: 86 hectares

Planned investment: Currently unconfirmed

Partners: Groundwork Wirral, The Mersey Forest, Mersey Waste Disposal Authority, Wirr

Site context: Bidston Moss is the last landmark travelling east bound on M53 before the Merse

Tunnel and can be seen by road and rail users alike. A former landfill site (closed 1990's), the area is currently classed as unsafe for public access. Greening work has already taken place (as part of the Groundwork land regeneration programme) on the edge of the site and measures have also been taken to secure the site and prever illegal motorbikes and vandals, who trouble the area. The site is close to several larger residential areas of Birkenhead North End, Bidston Rise, Poulton and Leasow Bidston Moss is also adjacent to a Site of Specific Biological Importance, home to mar

rare and protected species including barn owls and lapwings.

Future: Developments on Bidston Moss are intended to contribute both to an improvement

Newlands will concentrate on developing Bidston Moss as an important enhanceme to views from the area's strategic transport links, especially important in the short ter to link in with/support of the Capital of Culture 2008. The site is owned and manage by Mersey Waste Disposal Authority, and the developments through Newlands w enhance this company's commitment to the local area. In addition, the significa DEFRA investment into the Materials Recycling Facility close to the site's souther boundary will act as a gateway to the new woodland. A much needed, graded cyc track will link with the National Cycle Network and will connect with a new pedestris bridge over Wirral's mainline train track. Bidston Moss will become a feature in broader cycle provision development scheme with Wirral Borough Council ar
